

## Oak – February-April 2023



The Christian / Human Values we are exploring this half term are: Endurance and Hope Ethos question: What difficulties have people had to endure around the world? What changes did they hope for?



During English lessons this half term, the children will be further developing their understanding of grammatical structures and cohesive devices in writing. We will be writing a diary entry inspired by our class book The Explorer by Katherine Rundell.

We will also be writing a newspaper article based on our Rivers topic this half term. We will be looking at features and structures of newspapers and applying these to our own articles on flooding.

In reading this half term we will be focusing on a mixture of skills such as inference, summarising and retrieval through a broad range of texts. We will also be creating a reading journal based on our class book.

In Year 5, we will be continuing our learning on perimeter and area including how to find the area of compound shapes. This half-term we will also be studying statistics and how to convert between units of measure.

In Year 6, we will be continuing our learning on area and will be learning how to calculate the area of triangles and parallelograms. We will then begin our unit of work on volume. Later in the half-term we will be studying statistics and how to convert between units of measure.

Threaded through all of these topics, we will be developing our ability to solve multi-step problems and identifying the most effective methods. We will also be improving our reasoning, spotting patterns and make generalisations when working on solving mathematical problems.
